The National Screening Mechanism (NSM) marks a milestone in Thailand's refugee governance but fails to address

offers sustainable solutions for addressing systemic challenges in refugee livelihoods.

FCONOMIC SUPPORT THROUGH 7AKAT

- Immediate financial aid addressing basic needs like food and healthcare
- Potential for microcredit grants to promote self-reliance

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The UNHCR launched the Refugee zakat fund in 2019 to leverage Zakat and Sadaçah for refugee support, particularly in Olc countrie, which account for about 50% of refugees (UNHCR, 2019). Since 2017, the fund has aided around 8 million refugees through cash or goods, ensuring compliance with Zakat regulations. Managed transparently in an interest-free account in Geneva, it focuses exclusively on humanitarian needs in crisis-affected nations.

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT THROUGH WAQF

- Long-term solutions like education and vocational training
- Promotes self-reliance and community resilience

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RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

The IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation improves global welfare through sustainable projects in education, healthcare, and infrastructure. It supports over 150,000 Sytina relugaes in Container Cities with shelter, food, and education, including 43 schools and a university. Additionally, IHH provides monthly aid to over 10,000 orphane (Azid et al., 2022).

INTEGRATION INTO NSM

- Addresses economic vulnerabilities while aligning with cultural and political imperatives
 - Proposes collaborations with local Islamic institutions
- and international bodies like the Islamic Development Bank

CONCLUSIONS

Islamic social finance complements
Thailand's NSM by providing immediate
relief through zakat and long-term
development via waqf

Offers a sustainable pathway to reduce dependency on external aid and foster resilience
